#### HOMEWARD BOUND-THE FIRST PERIOD CLOSES

In about four hours—the ride of an hour to-day—they reached Liverpool, and found that because of storms the ship on which they had planned to sail would not leave as early as expected. The opportunity to counsel longer with Elders Fielding and Riehards, who had accompanied them to Liverpool, was welcomed. But when word reached Preston that they had been detained, Elder Clayton and others hastened to Liverpool, and largely filled their time. Before embarking Brother Kimball wrote several letters of eneouragement, counsel and warning to the branches.

On April 20th Elders Kimball, Hyde and Russell boarded the *Garrick*, the same sailing vessel that had brought the seven to British shores nine months before—Brothers Goodson and Snyder had previously departed; Elders Richards and Fielding were remaining.

The forepart of the passage was stormy. After twenty-two and one-half days at sea, during which time they preached on board again, the brethren landed in New York on May 12th after an absence of nearly ten and one-half months. There they had left only one member of the Church. Returning, they found a large branch. There they found Elder Elijah Fordham, who had waved them farewell.

So ends the first period of the British Mission story. The Gospel seed was planted in British soil. It was enlivated by able gardeners of the Lord. In less than nine months it yielded a glorious harvest. It has borne fruit each sneceeding year.
